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St. Mary's Church needs your help...

(No, not your money this time – just your help!)

Gamlingay has so much going for it. As someone who has lived here for 43 years I do feel justified in saying that! OK, perhaps ours is not the most picturesque village around but it does have some wonderful amenities, excellent services, lovely people and, dotted around, some fascinating nooks, crannies and old buildings. Whatever your views on 'The Church' as an institution you must surely agree that Gamlingay's greatest historical and aesthetic asset is the beautiful building that is, to give it its proper title, the Church of St. Mary the Virgin.

The church is, of course, used by the congregation for Sunday worship but it is also open every day for anyone to visit - and many do. There are those who just like to pop in and enjoy the peace and quiet for a few moments (I can thoroughly recommend it as a place to cool off on a hot summer's day!); some will come for private prayer and

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reflection; family researchers come from far and wide and often leave lovely comments in our visitors' book; many people just like visiting historical churches and we do sometimes have pre-booked groups who will be given a guided tour. They are often particularly interested in the ancient graffiti to be found etched into the walls and pillars. We frequently have visiting teams of bell-ringers and of course there are baptisms, weddings and funerals, not to mention the occasional concert or exhibition.

When visitors come into the church, at any time other than Lent or Advent, they will find beautiful flower arrangements and always, as far as is possible with such an ancient and crumbling building, they will find it clean and well-tended. We have a rota for cleaning the church but we also have an increasingly ageing and infirm congregation and that is where our plea for help arises!

If you agree that keeping the church open, available and welcoming for visitors is an asset to the community of Gamlingay would you consider coming on to our cleaning rota? Obviously the more people we have the better but anyone joining us now would not be expected to take a turn more than once in every 6/8 weeks. Cleaners work in pairs and are asked to do as much sweeping, vacuuming, dusting and polishing as they can manage in one or two hours, towards the end of the week preferably on a Friday or Saturday. All equipment and materials are provided and, to begin with at least, you would be paired with someone already on the rota who knew what they were doing! If the date you have been given proves to be inconvenient a swap can always be arranged.

Please do give it your serious consideration and if you would like to offer this as a small service to your local community give me a call on 650489 and prove the sceptics wrong!

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

My prayer for both the places I leave and the ones I arrive in is that we all give one another time to adjust to changes. We will flourish together if we allow ourselves to listen to God in all that takes place, so that we can be Kingdom people wherever and whoever we are. It is my intention to spend a number of weeks getting to know people and understanding the issues faced in our new situation before making any significant plans. I have recently been reflecting on the state of the world. That seems like a big, deep and meaningful statement, however I entered into said reflection through watching two different Netflix programs (please don't think I am always sitting pondering the ways of the world, I'm not). These two shows reminded me of so many difficult and sad things of the world: depression, suicide, rape, racism, privilege that comes with being male, with being rich, with being Caucasian (not necessarily simultaneously). These are all subjects that we don't really talk about. I can understand why... They make us uncomfortable because we know that they exist, but if we're not experiencing them, then why discuss them? Statistically however, these all affect the lives of many in Gamlingay, whether we discuss it or not.

These things reflect the brokenness of the world, and our brokenness as people. I know what you're thinking, 'I am not broken! How dare you imply that I am!' I apologise if this statement causes offence, it is not my intention. Maybe I can only speak for myself. I know that this brokenness in the world leads to pain in many ways, some more severe than others. The reality is that we cannot start addressing the brokenness until we accept that there is something broken to begin with. Once we do that, we can discuss the solution. What's that you may ask? Well, as a Christian I believe that God, and all He has to offer through a relationship with Jesus Christ, is the solution.

Please don't turn the page yet, stick with me.

As a Christian, I believe that God speaks into our brokenness and often uses our brokenness to help those around us. I also believe that God can mend our brokenness as well, **but** we need to accept the mere fact that we are broken. John Calvin once said, 'Only those who have learned well to be earnestly dissatisfied with themselves, and to be confounded with shame at their wretchedness truly understand the Christian gospel.' That Christian gospel (or good news as translated from the original language) is simply that God so loved the world (broken and all) that whoever believe in Him (and all that He teaches and asks of us), is forgiven, cleansed, restored, made new, and will have eternal life.

Maybe that's all a bit much to take in all at once, so let's focus on this: God can bring restoration to our brokenness. It's a journey, and may take time, but He *can* do it, so why not head to church and see what it might all be about?

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News from RSPB The Lodge, Sandy. by Mark Brandon

After a generally very warm and pleasant May, we hope the good spell now continues through the summer months. The spring bluebells have been replaced with colourful white and lilac foxgloves, cuckoos are calling the last of their calls before they make their return to Africa, and the hobbies are busy on the new heath preparing to raise their young again.

The Sandy Ridge field is currently covered in rusty red sheep sorrel and the whole reserve is green and vibrant after the ideal combination of sun and rain this spring.

We have now opened up a section of the new heathland loop, a short addition to the existing trails that give close up experiences of the restored heathland. It's already proving very popular, and visitors have enjoyed seeing green-tiger beetles, common lizards, small copper butterflies and cinnabar moths, amongst the many other beetles bees, wasps and bugs that thrive here.

We were very pleased when a spotted flycatcher arrived, although almost two weeks later than usual. One bird has been seen on occasions, but there is no evidence at this time that they are nesting here this year, although they could well be on another area of the reserve, although we haven't located them as yet.

A honey buzzard was the star bird for our volunteers and a local birder who were at the Visitor Centre as it flew low over the new heath, on a gloomy grey day in May. Sadly I missed it by just a few minutes!

Natterjack toads are doing well, with lots of toadlets in evidence and more strings of spawn appearing in the ponds.



On to our events, our outdoor theatre shows will take place over the summer. The first is the Adventures of Dr Dolittle by the Illyria theatre company on Sunday July 8 at 6pm (tickets; illyria.co.uk), followed by the very popular annual Pantaloons shows.

This year the group are performing Shakespeare's 'As You Like it' on Saturday 25 August and Oscar Wilde's 'The Importance of being Earnest on Sunday 26th August. On both of these days we have two shows at 2pm and 7pm. Tickets; www.the pantaloons.co.uk, or available to buy on the day.

Hope you can come along and enjoy The Lodge this summer, we look forward to welcoming you.

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

Combined Authority

The political landscape in Cambridgeshire is getting more and more complex. As well as the County Council (responsible for education, health and social care) and the District Councils (responsible for planning, housing and waste management) we have the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) (formally The City Deal) attempting to deliver transport improvements in South Cambs/ Cambridge and now the Combined Authority (CA) and the Mayor doing transport, housing and skills throughout the whole county and Peterborough. It will be no surprise that this is proving somewhat challenging to work with especially as there is overlap in what they are all wanting (and in some cases failing) to do.

The Mayor has recently taken over responsibility for the Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) which was responsible for the Economic Development Strategy for a very large area including all Cambridgeshire. This concerns us as we are very aware that South

Cambs and Cambridge City are the power house driving the economy of the whole County and there is no guarantee that the Mayor is as committed as one would hope to ensuring the continued successful business growth of our area.

He has even more recently tried to halt the well developed plans of the GCP to build some new park and rides and to put a Busway along the A428 corridor. This would not be a problem if it were clear that the CA was going to be able to solve the ever-increasing congestion problems facing us all (but especially people commuting in and out of Cambridge) in the short term but that is not the case.

It's clear that the CA is beginning to flex its muscles. The Mayor and the CA would like to subsume the GCP much as they did the LEP. At the most recent meeting it laid out its four year plan which encompasses several ambitious transport schemes (including the CAM metro and, worryingly, an extension of the M11 northwards to Wisbech) and began to consider the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Independent

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County Council HQ relocation to Alconbury

The reform referred to above was one (of many) reasons why we do not support the move of the County Council HQ to Alconbury - a decision made at the last Council meeting and which is based on an assessment which is riddled with inaccuracy and unjustified assumptions. CCC will build a shiny new HQ just in time to disappear (potentially) and – given our not very good track record - it's likely to be over budget and over schedule. Alconbury is almost entirely devoid of any kind of public transport - just think for a second - how would YOU get there? If all we need is an office block for 300+ officers then why not in or around Cambridge? It's a terrible waste of your tax which could be far better spent on frontline services.

Fire Authority

The saga of the Police and Crime Commissioner's (PCC) attempt to take over the running of the Fire Service rumbles on. The Fire Authority has agreed to pursue a Judicial Review of the Home Secretary's decision to allow the power grab on the basis that she did not meet the statutory criteria and

secondly that she used an internal Home Office (HO) report to inform her opinion which the HO now refuses to share with us.

Why do we care so much? Firstly, Gamlingay has a Fire Station (as do many smaller communities) which must be in the sights of the PCC's drive to save cash. Secondly, it might be argued that the PCC has enough to do already with a Police service which does not have a brilliant record with the public. Lastly the Fire Service is extremely well run with a lean financial regime and on the basis of if it ain't broke...

Drains do not Like Wet Wipes.

The flash flood in Cinques Road Gamlingay at the beginning of the month was the direct result of the sewers being blocked by wet wipes. The heavy rainfall flooded the foul water system as well as overloading the surface drains and the result was that some households ended up having raw sewage lapping at their front doors. Anglia Water attended but blamed 'The Council' for failing to maintain the drains sufficiently well. But the bottom line is that if people continue to put stuff down their loo which should not go down there then the drains will block.

Responsibility for the sewers is Anglian Water's. The County Council is responsible for the surface water drains and South Cambs is

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responsible for ensuring that any contamination from sewage is cleared up by the people responsible for it. Needless to say these things nearly always happen at weekend or out of office hours and it is really hard to get anyone to answer the phone.

A428 Dualling

We were invited to attend a briefing at Tempsford about the proposed A428 dualling from the Black Cat to Caxton where we learnt that a preferred route announcement will 'definitely' be made in 2018 followed by a four month consultation period. It will not be part of the Cambridge – Oxford Expressway as the scheme is too far advanced – but it will be future-proofed so it slots in easily. We'll see.

Robinson Court

We now know that some local people have secured the shared equity housing in Robinson Court which we are absolutely delighted about. The application procedure has been unnecessarily complex and has resulted in quite a lot of stress for some people and for this we can only apologise. We shall be looking into how lessons can be learnt for next time. If you are interested in the rental housing or the market housing do keep a close eye on the site and on Homelink as they are likely to go like hotcakes.

Does Gamlingay have a new quarry?

Activity at the old Cambs Recycling site on Potton Road has led to action being taken by the County Council's enforcement officers. It appears that sand was being extracted and the resulting void being backfilled with inert waste. This is without planning permission and the site owner has now agreed to stop activity, refill the voids and dispose of the waste in an authorised site. This should take two months.

Citizens Advice Centres (CAB)

We mentioned before that Gamlingay residents have been turned away from CAB offices in St Neots and Biggleswade. We now understand that Rural Cambs CAB - who run the St Neots office - are changing their processes and moving towards a system where there will no longer be any face-to-face drop in sessions, and all clients will have to contact them initially via their contact centre (there is a possibility that some emergency drop-in sessions will be retained if necessary). For the approximately 20% who need additional face to face help following the initial contact, an appointment will be made at one of Rural CAB's 'agile' locations, which are in libraries, doctors' surgeries, etc.

This is of grave concern to us as one of the consequences of austerity has been that it is getting more and more difficult to access advice, help and support. One of the main services that CAB offer is on debt management which we know needs to be accessed quickly by people in order for them to avoid even bigger problems than the ones they already have. There is a self-service CAB terminal in the Eco Hub which is free and which the staff can help you to use.

We shall be reviewing the grants which South Cambs DC

gives to CAB to ensure that all our residents have access to the level of support they need.

Parklife 2018

If you and the family would like an active day out please come to Parklife 2018 at Milton Country Park between 10am and 5pm on July 1st. There will be a whole host of water based activities to have a go at as well as cycling, football, archery, den building and climbing. Full details and advance bookings can be found at www.scambs.uk/parklife

The Council is also offering a number of summer sports camps in athletics, netball and rounders and Kwik Cricket. www.scambs.gov.uk/sportscamps. The cost is £24 per day and camps are open to children aged 7-14.

South Cambs DC News

One of our first actions upon taking over control of SCDC has been to establish two new committees and one new working group. The Climate and Environment Committee will be looking at all the ways in which the Council can positively influence matters both in its own and its partners' operations to reduce damage to the climate and improve our environment.

The new Grants Committee is reviewing all the grants currently administered by the Council to make sure that they are providing maximum benefit where it is most needed. Money is very short these days and so no council can be as generous as it was ten years ago. We are spending your money and so need to be able to be confident that we are spending it well and to best effect.

The Brexit Working Group is investigating ways in which the Council can help businesses in and around South Cambs to cope with any anticipated or actual consequences of Brexit. We already know that farmers are struggling to get the gangs they used to be able to get easily to harvest their crops and that some of the high skills industries, which are reliant on a

European workforce, are seeing a reduction in applicants from outside Britain. This would not be a problem if we had all the skills they need within British-born people but we don't and so there is a risk that these big employers could consider relocating abroad. On top of this is the reliance of our already over stretched health service - especially hospital-based services on people from other countries. This covers all professions from our top consultants to the physios, emergency responders, nurses and cleaners.

Housing Land Supply

As you may recall South
Cambridgeshire District Council
could not demonstrate that it had
a rolling five year land supply for
housebuilding. As a result, any
policies that sought to restrict
residential development were
suspended and in particular our
village frameworks. This has meant
planning permission for over
5,000 houses has been granted
where previously it would have
been resisted. Some villages like
Waterbeach and Cottenham have
continued on page 16

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been very badly damaged by this but many have suffered to a greater or lesser degree. We all accept we need houses and quickly, but the development must be planned and delivered properly making sure provision is made for GPs, schools, road, and all the other obvious things.

Thankfully, as of the 21st May SCDC considers that it can now demonstrate a five year housing land supply of five years for the period 2018-2023 using the stricter calculation required by Government (the Sedgefield method) and applying a 20% buffer. This is good news.

Needless to say the Local Plan Inspector still has not released her final report. If she manages to spin it out to September the Local Inquiry will have taken longer than the one for Sellafield. That's quite a demonstration of ineptitude.

A1198 Overnight Closures

A head's up that the A1198 will be closed overnight for major resurfacing works from September 10th to 21st. Diversions will be in place and actual timings are weather dependent. Good news that Highways are taking some action here as currently the road surface is badly damaged and potentially dangerous.

Why resurface the A603?

Residents from everywhere have been questioning why the A603 in Wimpole is scheduled for resurfacing when it's the only road for miles around without an actual pothole. The Highway Inspector noticed some defects in the surfacing in that the road was displaying signs that the binding material (oils) were beginning to separate from the aggregate. This then leads to the road surface failing, so if it's not caught quickly enough potholes will start to appear.

Surface dressing will remedy this, but what it will not do is fix roads that are already showing signs of serious deterioration or are heavily potholed. (i.e. all the other ones). It is a preventative treatment and significantly more cost effective than allowing the road to deteriorate to such a point where a full resurfacing job is required.

As for the cat's eyes these will not be making a return. A class roads feature road studs down the centreline mainly due to their high speed nature. This doesn't apply In Wimpole as it is street lit and has a lower speed limit.

Flooding in Arrington

Many residents have been in touch about the new river along the A1198 that appears after any heavy rain. A wide range of interested parties met at the start of May to see what the problems were and what solutions could be agreed. Neighbours, the solar farm, Highways, the National Trust and more now have a series of actions to take to see if we can prevent Cambridgeshire's newest river from becoming permanent. We will report next month on the results of a series of camera inspections done under the road.

Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG)

We reported last month on the parlous state of the CCG. It has now agreed a £42.1m deficit and a financial plan that will end 2018-19 at £35m deficit. A capacity and capability review by Price Waterhouse Coopers further identifies - amongst a long list of deficiencies - a history which demonstrates a lack of grip, action, financial forecasting, financial control and delivery. In particular a failure to deliver reduction in demand required to offset planned growth in the system; instability at leadership level impacting on delivery and causing uncertainty for staff; a lack of experienced leadership and capacity, resulting in insufficient grip, control and energy to drive improvement and the ineffectiveness of the Governing Body to ensure the CCG met its statutory duties. An action plan has been agreed but amazingly - not a single Governor has thought they should resign for this appalling performance. Well, at least we don't think anyone has because our enquiries have been

met by stony silence.

Wimpole Estate application

You may be interested in the application by the National Trust to build a multi-use trail around the estate – the second application for this is now open for consultation quoting reference S/1694/18/FL at South Cambs.

Tips for the Garden in July and August

What is a garden?

The dictionary's definition is 'A piece of ground adjoining a house, in which grass, flowers, and shrubs may be grown' which sounds a bit dull really.

I think a garden has far more emotion attached to it, in hard work, blood, sweat and tears. It's a chance to bring a bit of nature into our world and try to tame it or perhaps a chance to let nature have its way and tame us. Either way most of us enjoy the thought of a garden even if we're not keen gardeners.

Summer is a time when our gardens are looking their fullest, plants are in bloom or have bloomed and probably need a good prune before they take over the garden.

Spring produced a whole mixture of weather, boiling hot sun followed by heavy, torrential rain. Cold wintery days followed by heat waves. I know I couldn't keep up with the unpredictability let alone our poor gardens. This weather has been brilliant news for weeds, they seem to have flourished. Try to keep on top of the weeding, use a good dutch hoe.

This can be is the hottest and driest time of the year, so make sure you water all pots and hanging baskets. They need watering even if it rains because the water doesn't stay in the baskets for very long and they can get missed if they sit close

to a fence or wall. You can buy slow release crystals to mix into your baskets that absorb the water and release it back slowly.

Try to keep disease and aphids down all through the year. If you have to use a pesticide, spray in the evening when there are less bees and ladybirds about. Ladybirds are a natural predator of black and green fly and should be encouraged, they are not a pest. Pick out slugs and snails by hand if you can or leave a trail of salt around vulnerable plants to deter them. Encourage the birds and hedgehogs into your garden to feast on the snails.


Mow the grass except in a drought. Don't worry if the grass starts to yellow, it will soon come back in the autumn. Only if you have a new lawn, then you must water every day, until it is established. A lot of people are having artificial turf now, as it looks so real, idiot

You can choose from all diverse types, colours and lengths. Like choosing a carpet. Its so easy to look after, ideal for families, pets and the elderly, requiring very little maintenance.

Continue to dead head roses, as this will encourage new shoots and flowers and give them a good feed, rich in potash. The potash will deter black spot. Keep watering them with a fungicide should prevent mildew. Remember to burn all diseased cuttings.

Invest in a good sun cream and hat when out in the garden, especially when it's hot. Sun stroke or burnt skin is no joke. Remember to drink plenty of water. Most of us feel exhausted from a day in the

garden because we are dehydrated. Enjoy the summer and your space outside, your little bit of England. Nature trapped in all its





Scheme to reduce homelessness in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough

supported by Police Commissioner

A central government funded project to look at new and creative ways to reduce homelessness in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough is being supported by Police and Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite.

Councils in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough were awarded £736,000 to work together to prevent homelessness in January 2017. The scheme, now in place for over a year, is working with a range of partners who can all play their part in preventing homelessness.

Police Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite met with members of the Trailblazer service, housing officers and representatives from criminal justice services at an event in Huntingdon earlier this month (May 9th) to discuss developing clearer pathways for people with experience of the criminal justice system.

Police and Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite said:

"The Trailblazer project gives us a great opportunity to look at what prevents vulnerable people from finding suitable housing. People can find themselves homeless for a whole variety of reasons: they may be in debt, struggling with complex needs, coming out of prison or having issues with landlords.

"Working together we can ensures all agencies play their part in preventing homelessness to allow people to live fulfilling lives. There is still a long way to go but I am optimistic that together we can make homelessness an unacceptable outcome."

The Trailblazer team is building good relationships with other sectors on behalf of local authority housing teams, for example with criminal justice services, hospital discharge teams, children and adult social services.

Helen Brown, Trailblazer Project Homeless Prevention Manager said:

"Many offenders face difficulties securing and maintaining a home which can contribute to a chaotic lifestyle. It was good to have representatives from so many different housing and criminal justice services working in partnership to help address these difficulties. The agencies have agreed to build on the ideas that came out of the event.

The Trailblazer project can only be successful with the commitment and support of our partner agencies. We are extremely grateful that The Police and Crime Commissioner has pledged his support in helping to make homelessness the unacceptable outcome."

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
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vegetarian recipes aderick Starksfield

SLOW BRAISED FENNEL

I was recently at our local Farm Shop, and was selecting some fennel. A lady behind me commented that she wouldn't know what to do with fennel ...

Fennel is a lovely vegetable, tasting of anise, slightly sweet and a good crunch. There are many ways to serve it:

Raw thinly sliced in a salad or Coleslaw

In a Gratin (with lots of cream and a few Olives)

Baked, Braised, etc.

It go well with many dishes as a side dish or makes a meal in itself.

Baked it can, unless well cooked on a low heat for a long time, be a bit tough.

In the recipe below I use a method of cooking fennel given in Richard Buckley's book 'Acorn Vegetarian Kitchen'.

The amounts given below are for one person as a main meal, two as a starter. Just multiply up for more.

Ingredients

Slow cooked fennel:

1 fennel bulb

1oz/25gm sugar

21/2 oz/60gm vinegar

1oz/25gm salt

2 star anise

3 black pepper corns

Small sprig of tarragon

Water

Plum Sauce

2 or 3 plums

Desert spoon of sugar

Tablespoon of vinegar

Splash of balsamic Vinegar (optional)

Good pinch of salt

Water

Cheese 'Egg'

11/2 oz/40 gm Mascarpone

1½oz/40gm mature blue cheese

Method

Trim the fennel, remove any brown or damaged 'leaves' and cut in half length-wise. Leave the root core in as it keeps the whole thing together.

Place the fennel and the other ingredients, except the tarragon, in a saucepan, add enough water to just cover the fennel. Bring to a light boil and simmer for about 10-15 minutes. Keep checking that the fennel is meltingly soft, it may take up to 20 minutes.

Remove the fennel, and discard the liquid and flavourings. Place on kitchen paper to drain off This can be done up to a day in advance. When ready to serve, heat a knob of butter and a splash of oil in a frying pan and place the fennel, cut side up in the pan. After about four minutes, the fennel should have started to turn golden, turn it over and continue until the cut side is nicely browned.

Prepare the plum sauce. Remove the stones from the plums and chop into small dice. Add with the other ingredients to a saucepan, cover with water and bring to a slow boil. You will need to keep topping up the water to give soft pouring consistency. While this is cooking, use the back of spoon to squash the plum pieces to break them up, a bit of texture is fine. Check the seasoning It can take quite a bit of pepper and salt.


To make the Cheese 'Egg'. Mash together the Mascarpone and the blue cheese to make a smooth paste.

To serve:

Place a line if the sauce down the centre of your serving plate. Add the fennel, cut side up, across this line. Shape the cheese into a quenelle using two desert spoons and place between the fennel. Sprinkle with chopped tarragon.


